Hello from lowa Adventures on the Wabash

The Wabash does not hibernate. My old commuter bike, with bags and racks could carry clothes for adapting to the weather on the Ullr Bash this January 14. The hard frozen surface was punctuated with quick white-knuckle ice patches on the way down to Toby Jacks for the beginning of the ride (Don't tense up, just follow the wheel and keep your balance). OK, I'm a weenie, no kilts or shorts for me, but there were a few, just a few, leading the other 60 or so of us back up the trail to Margaritaville. Finding little stuffed huskie dogs hidden along the Trace gave finders a turn in the money machine back at Toby Jacks. Ullr Nordic Libation as well as other high-proof circulation enhancers delayed departure from Margaritaville back to Toby Jacks. RAGBRAI is infamous for their beer slides. The beer slides at Toby Jacks were more temperature appropriate. They involved a stein of beer sliding to the edge of an icy table. The day of games and silent auction raised over \$4,000 for Western Pottawattamie County Trails.

Things had thawed out by March 4. It had been dry and warm for several weeks. I figured the Trace would be ready for a ride to Shenandoah. I was wrong. An off-road terrorist of some kind had plowed such nasty furrows south from the trail head that it was hard to tell that the trail was still too soft to be on. I got off onto Pioneer Trail. A few miles brought me to Dumfries Ave. then left onto Aspen Road, a smooth, hard-packed gravel county road. Then on to L-45, the road that crosses the Trace at the Zion Cemetery. The gravel on that road was fresher, so I was too scared, really, to take advantage of the many down-hill sides of the rollers down to Brothers Ave. That road parallels the Trace across Keg Creek into Mineola. Most people are familiar with Barrus Road and L55 that make a right angle parallel of the Trace to Silver City. Pretty L55 continues south up the hill and past the Silver City Cemetery across 8 miles of hills down to definitely ugly Hwy 34. Trying to avoid as much of Hwy 34. as I could, I took the gravel road that angles into Malvern along the Trace. Two miles of hellish loose gravel and washboard was topped off with a flat. I should have stayed on Hwy 34. When I got to C&M's Cafe, a couple at the next table helped me with some directions to the right fork in the road that leads south out of Malvern to a pretty, and mostly flat, 10 miles of road with almost no traffic. I jogged left thorough Randolph to another pretty road, L68, continuing south another 10 miles. Nine miles and nine hills east on J32 got me into Shenandoah. The Shenandoah Inn and Suites are very bike friendly and let me take my bike to the room.

Finally, the Trace was back to its old summertime self this last, April 8th week-end. The damage from the off-road terrorist is beginning to heal, so the surface was rough, but solid, between the ruts. The Trace was fairly busy. I even met a couple at Toby Jacks riding self-contained for an overnight at the campground at Imogene. Another riding season begins. Come on over for a ride on the wild side. Save the date, The Great American Pie Ride is coming on May 20^{th.}




BRAN 41 Updates:


